

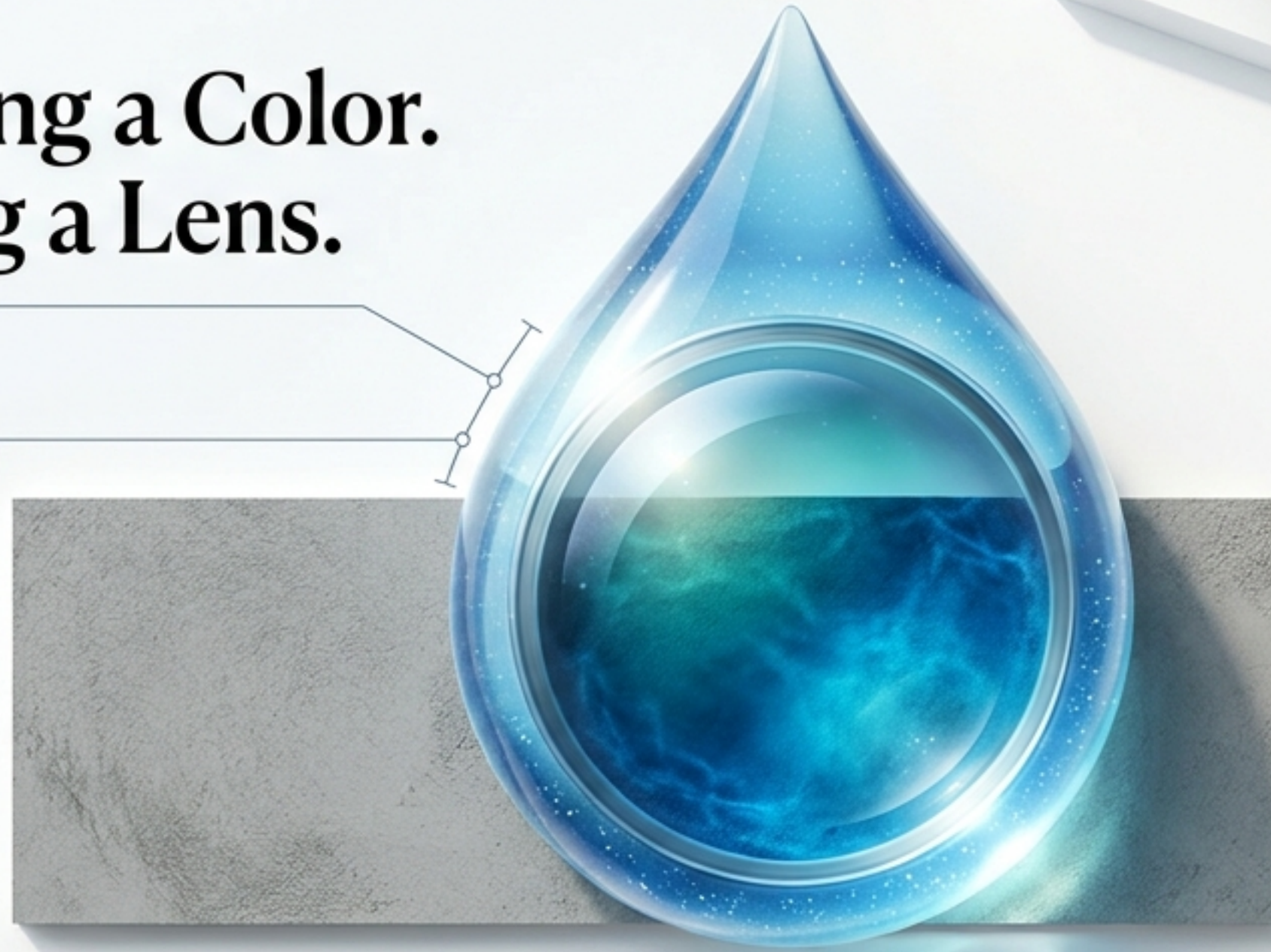

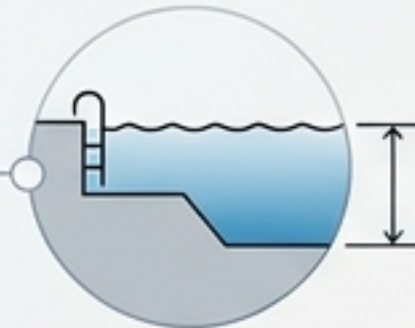
The most common misconception in pool design is that the color of the finish is the color of the water.



Water is a dynamic canvas influenced by four synergistic elements:



Base Color



Depth



Thermodynamics

Base Color Science: The Foundation of Hue

The Blues



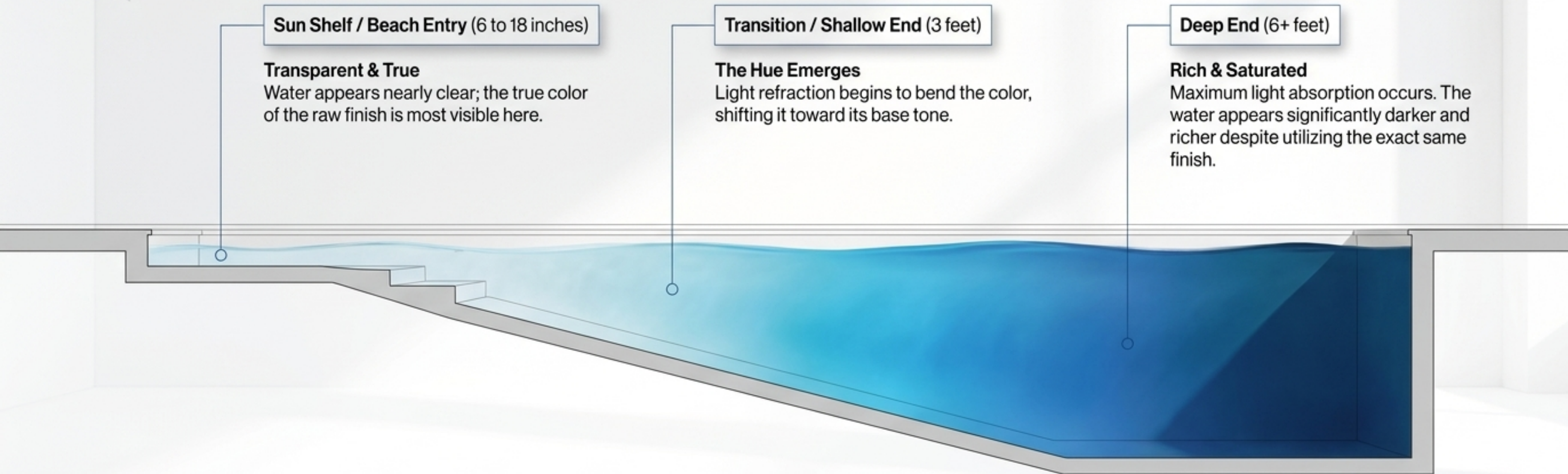
White, Blue, & Gray Bases
Produces crisp, classic blue tones. Ranges from light, sparkling tropical blues to deep, rich ocean navies.

The Teals

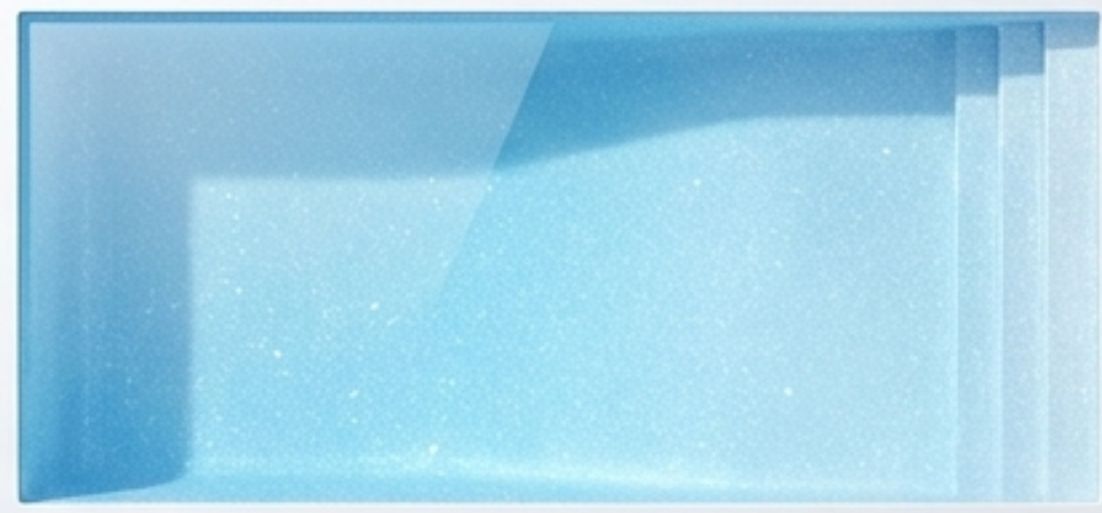


Green, Tan, Brown, & Black Bases
Produces blue-green, aquamarine, and teal tones. Creates a natural, mountain-lake or lush lagoon aesthetic.

Light Finishes

(White / Light Blue / Gray)

The Cool Retreat. Reflects sunlight. Keeps water noticeably cooler, ideal for unshaded pools in intense southern or tropical climates.



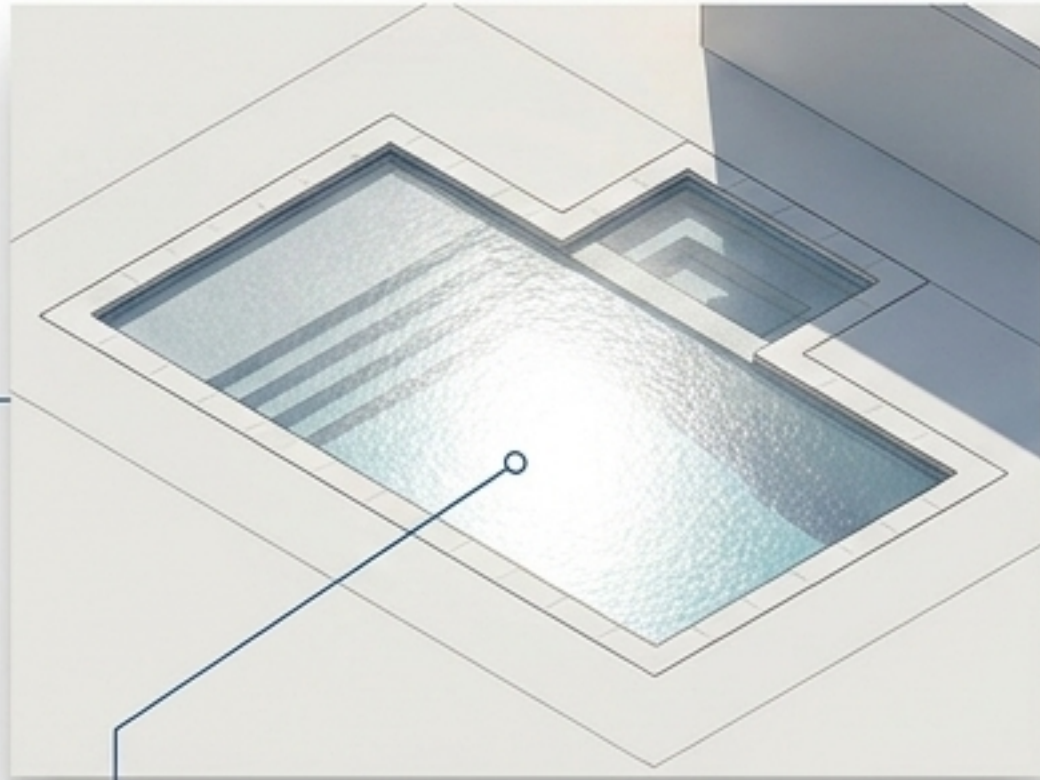
Dark Finishes

(Dark Blue / Black / Brown)

The Heat Sink. Absorbs and holds solar heat. Can raise water temperatures by several degrees, naturally extending the swim season and reducing artificial heating costs.

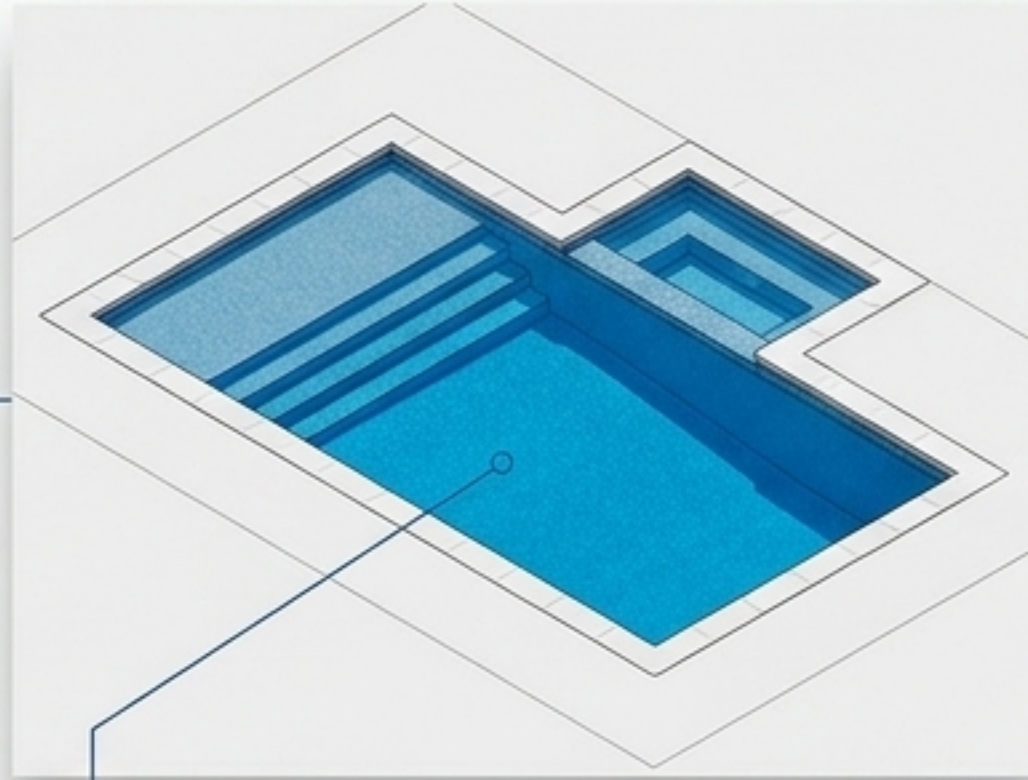
Environmental Influences: The Sky is Your Ceiling

Morning
(Low Sun Angle)



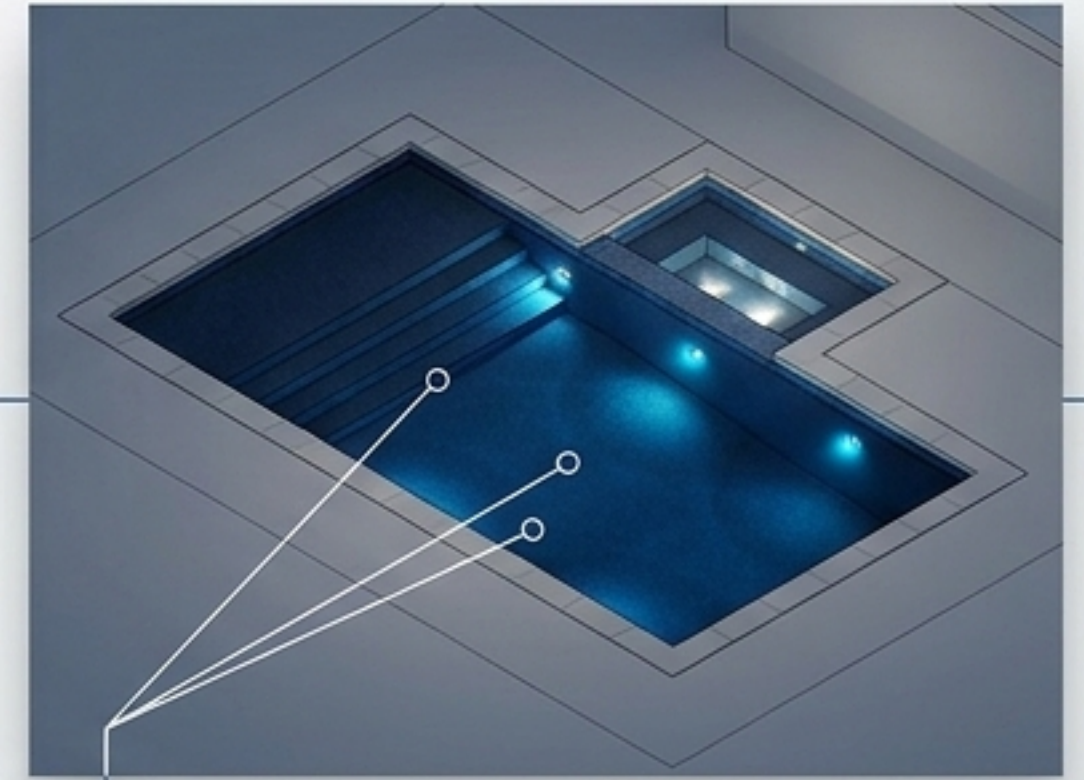
Creates surface glare and highlights the physical texture of exposed aggregate finishes.

High Noon
(Direct Overhead Sun)



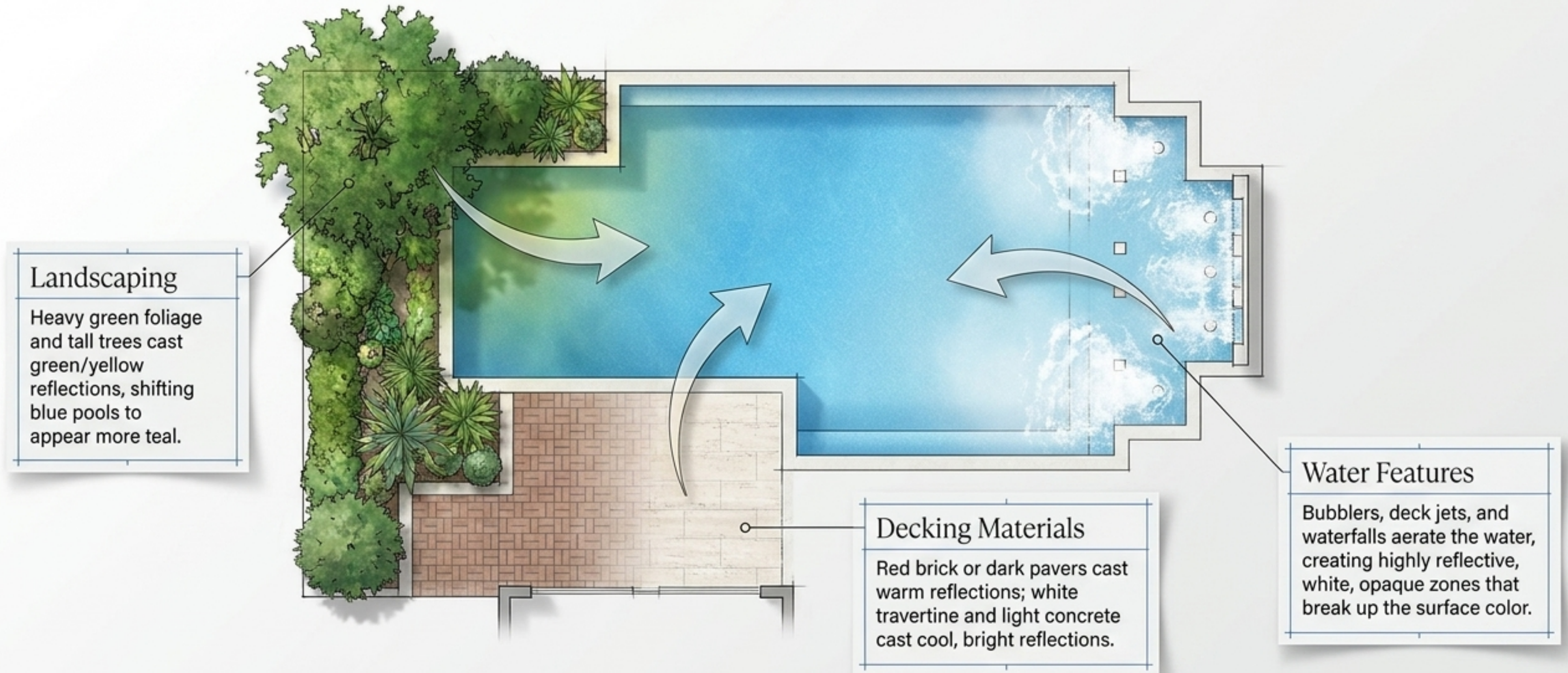
Sunlight penetrates deep into the volume, revealing the truest, most vibrant base color of the finish.

Dusk & Night
(Shadows & LED)

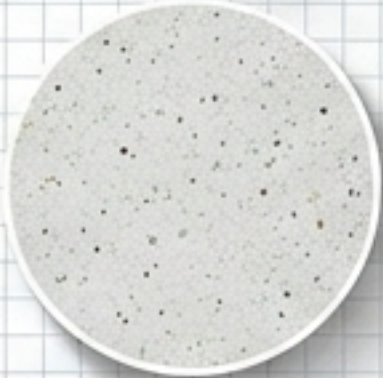


Shadows deepen the water's hue. Artificial LED lighting placement and color now dictate the entire mood and aesthetic.

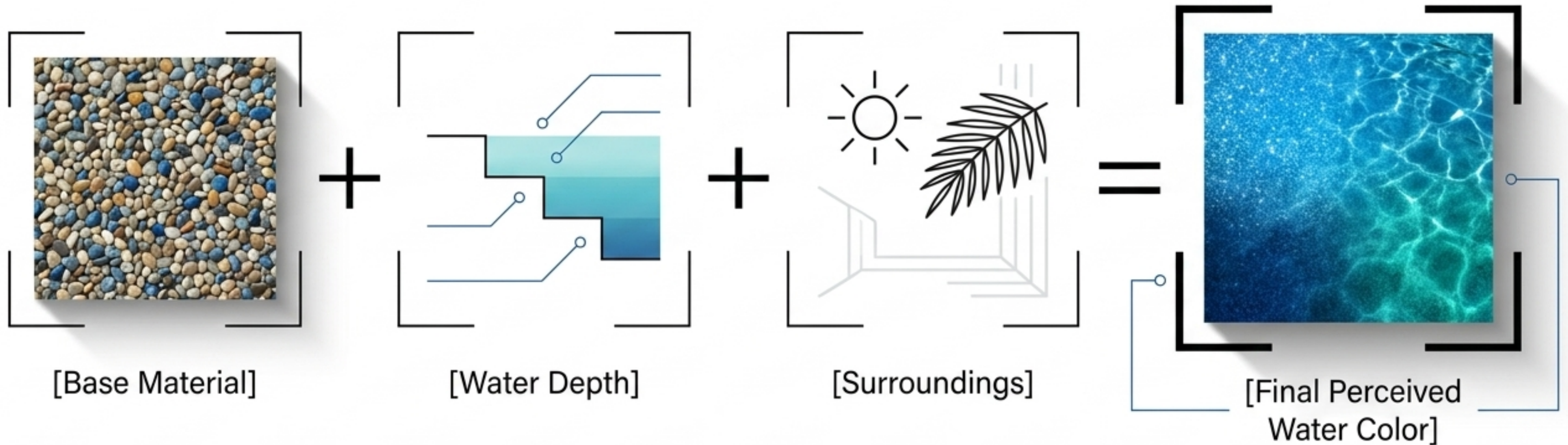
Environmental Influences: The Backyard Ecosystem



Choosing Your Canvas: Material Types & Longevity

	Standard Plaster (Marcite)	Classic, smooth, economical. Highly susceptible to water chemistry imbalances.	Lifespan: 5-8 years.
	Quartz Finish	Plaster fortified with crushed quartz. Smoother than pebble, significantly more durable than plaster.	Lifespan: 10-15 years.
	Exposed Aggregate (Pebble)	Premium durability. Fade- resistant, highly textured, dynamic color profiles.	Lifespan: 15-20+ years.

The Water Color Equation



Color variations across steps, depths, and times of day are not application flaws; they are a normal, dynamic enhancement of the water reacting to its environment.

Next Steps: Preparing for Your Contractor



Define Your Vibe

Decide between a crisp blue resort feel (white/gray base) or a natural teal lagoon (tan/black base).

Assess Your Ecosystem

Note your dominant landscaping colors and sun exposure to anticipate color shifts.

Consider Climate

Choose dark finishes to retain heat or light finishes to stay cool.

Demand Authenticity in Contracts

Ensure bids specify the exact brand and color, avoiding open-ended terms like 'exposed aggregate' to prevent inferior substitutions.

Verify Coverage & Warranty

Ensure proper material coverage and record finish batch numbers from the manufacturer's bags onsite to secure your warranty.
